Section 1 Demographic Information and Projections for a Ten-Year Planning Period

The East Tennessee Development District (ETDD) is comprised of sixteen counties in the mid-east region of Tennessee with an area of 6,563.5 square miles and a population of approximately 1,235,708 people. The sixteen counties of ETDD are geographically, economically, and demographically diverse, ranging in size from Union County with a population of approximately 20,000 to Knox County with just over 465,000 residents. Across a landscape that varies from rolling rural farmland to highly urbanized cityscapes, the approximately 1.236 million residents of the district enjoy mountains, rivers, lakes, and America's most visited national park. Table 1-A below details 2018 population levels along with area in square miles and population density for each of the sixteen counties of ETDD.

Over the past decade, the ETDD region as a whole saw a 6% growth rate, with district-wide population increasing from 1,162,520 in 2008 to 1,235,708 in 2018. Growth over the ten-year period was primarily concentrated in the southcentral part of the district, with Loudon and Sevier Counties experiencing the highest growth rates—12% and 11% respectively—and with Knox County at 9% and Blount County at 8% growth rates. Counties along the east and north edges of the district—Campbell, Claiborne, Morgan, Roane, and Scott Counties--experienced negative growth over the decade, with population losses ranging from 155 in Scott County to 1,234 residents in Roane County. Cocke County had a zero population growth rate for the decade, and the remaining six counties, Anderson, Grainger, Hamblen, Jefferson, Monroe, and Union saw moderate growth in population over the same time period. 

Population projections from the TN State Data Center at the University of Tennessee show that the ETDD region will experience 6% growth from 2020-2029. This is the exact same rate of growth the region experienced over the previous decade. Projections show that growth will continue to be primarily concentrated in the southcentral area, with Sevier and Loudon Counties continuing to have the largest growth rates for the decade at 11% and 10% respectively, and with Knox County at a projected growth rate of 8%, Blount County at 7%, and Jefferson County at 6%. Campbell and Roane Counties are projected to experienced negative growth over the decade, with Campbell County losing approximately 948 residents and Roane County losing around 95 residents from 2020-2029. Scott County is projected to have a near zero population growth rate for the decade, gaining approximately 83 residents, and the remaining eight counties, Anderson, Claiborne, Cocke, Grainger, Hamblen, Monroe, Morgan, and Union are projected to have minimal growth in population over the same time period, with growth rates ranging from 1-4%. Table 1-C and Charts 1-C and 1-D detail projected population data for the 16 counties of ETDD from 2020-2029.

The solid waste infrastructure utilized by the 16 counties of the East Tennessee Development District region over the past decade was adequate for handling the solid waste generated by the populace. For disposal, the nine Class I landfills and ten Class III landfills located within the district boundaries ably handled the waste generated over the past decade, with landfills in counties outside the district, such as Bradley, Marshall, and Shelby Counties, reporting minimal waste disposal (as low as 0.16 tons) from within ETDD. Meadow Branch Landfill in McMinn County and Rhea County Landfill reported receiving more significant tonnages from within ETDD, though this waste came primarily from the bordering counties of Monroe and Roane. See Section 3 for more detailed information on the flow of wastes from the counties of ETDD. Additionally, the collection needs of the communities of ETDD over the last decade were adequately met by the infrastructure currently in place. Hamblen County and thirty-five of the fifty-six municipalities within the district provide curbside collection of Class I waste for their residents, and all sixteen counties provide an adequate number of convenience center locations to people living within their boundaries. See Section 5 for a more detailed discussion of the solid waste collection and recycling services in each county.

With district-wide population growth projected to remain at the same 6% growth rate over the next decade as the previous ten-year period and county population growth projected to remain at relatively the same levels as the previous decade with growth concentrated in the same geographic area of the district, there is little reason to anticipate that population growth within the ETDD region will have a significant impact on solid waste infrastructure needs. The same collection and disposal systems that so capably served the district for the past decade will easily handle the waste stream generated by the projected population numbers over the 2020-2029 timeframe. As more rural communities consider adding curbside recycling collection to the services provided for their residents, the existing infrastructure will only be improving over the next decade, taking an already adequate level of service to the next level.



